### The Helen Terry MacLeod Research Grant

The Pembroke Center for Teaching and Research on Women annually awards the Helen Terry MacLeod Research Grant to a student, from any field, in support of completion of an honors thesis on issues related to women and gender. Helen Terry MacLeod (1901-1994) was the paternal grandmother of Joan MacLeod Heminway'83. Although Helen Terry MacLeod did not have a college education, she contributed to the undergraduate, graduate, and professional school educations of her grandchildren, including that of her granddaughter, Joan, through (among other things) monetary gifts and loans. While she worked in the home and raised (single-handedly, at times) two boys, she also believed in the right and responsibility of young women to meet and exceed their educational goals. The Helen Terry MacLeod Research Grant honors her life as a whole, but particularly her support of, and commitment to, higher education for women.
